Angela research focuses on food policy, mainly in Latin America. She is a PhD candidate at the Faculty of Public Health and Policy at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. Her current research is a policy analysis of the Mexican soda tax. She worked as a Research Fellow at the National Institute of Public Health in Mexico for more than nine years, conducting extensive research with an interdisciplinary team of civil society and legislators to advocate for policies tackling obesity in Mexico, and in collaboration with scholars from University of North Carolina, Universidad de Sao Paulo, INTA and PAHO and UNICEF. She has conducted volunteer work with the World Health Organization Department of Nutrition and Health, World Obesity Federation and recently the INSP's INFORMAS project and food labelling projects. She has a certificate on Social Marketing from the University of South Florida (USF), Community Based Participatory Research from University of Michigan and has a Diploma in Paediatric Environmental Health. From 2009-2013 she was lecturer of the Food Policy at the Universidad Iberoamericana in Mexico, and for the Nutrition Program Monitoring and Evaluation module of the postgraduate degree in Public Health Nutrition at the INSP where she still collaborates as student supervisor. She has written on topics about children nutrition, corporations and global health governance, and health taxes, and food labelling with the Food Research Collaboration and UNICEF. Currently, she is working on publications related to her research on fiscal policies on SSB and on the influence of non-state actors on the nutrition policymaking. She has co-authored results of the 2016 Mexican National Nutrition Survey results, Mexican Food Guidelines 2014 and some peer-review and policy briefs on food labelling and SSB taxes.
